APA Headings

Headings are similar to topics in an outline. Knowing APA's style for each heading (e.g. Level 1 is centered and in bold) allows readers to skim a paper and understand how it is organized.

- A level 1 heading is the broadest topic (like the roman numeral I in an outline).
- A level 2 heading is a subset of the level 1 topic (like the capital letter A in an outline).
- A level 3 heading is a subset of the level 2 heading (like the number 1 under the A under the I in an outline).
- I. Broad Topic = Level 1
 - A. Subhead of I = Level 2
 - 1. Subhead of A = Level 3
 - 2. Another subhead of A = Level 3
 - B. Another subhead of I = Level 2
- II. Next Broad Topic = Level 1
 - A. Subhead of II = Level 2
 - 1. Subhead of A = Level 3

Please note: The outline form above should not be used in lieu of APA's requirements as depicted on p. 6 of the sample paper.
