# Strayhorn: Take the A Train, by the Duke Ellington Orchestra

DATE OF WORK: Recorded February 15, 1941

FORM: 32-bar song form (A-A-B-A, each 8-bar phrases), in 3 choruses

MEDIUM: Jazz big band (trumpets, trombones, saxophones, piano, guitar, bass,

drums); soloists: Duke Ellington (piano), Ray Nance (trumpet)

TEMPO: Moderate; 4/4 meter

WHAT TO LISTEN FOR: Big band sound, with reed, brass, and rhythm sections.

Call-and-response exchanges between the instruments.

Syncopated rhythmic character of the themes.

Special jazz effects (bent notes, shakes, glissando) by solo trumpet.

Closing "fades out," playing main theme.

**Introduction**—4 measures, piano (Ellington), with syncopated, chromatic motive and rhythm accompaniment.

#### Chorus 1 (A-A-B-A)

A—unison saxophones state disjunct melody, in key of *C*, in interjections from muted trumpets and trombones (8 bars) against steady rhythm accompaniment:



A-repeated (8 bars).

## Chorus 2 (A-A-B-A)

Features Ray Nance on muted trumpet, accompanied by saxes and rhythm section; trumpet solo in 2nd phrase, with bent pitches:



 $\textbf{Interlude} - 4\,\text{measures},\,\text{sustained}\,\text{accents}\,\text{as}\,\text{though}\,\text{in}\,\text{triple}\,\text{rather}\,\text{than}\,\text{quadruple}\,\text{meter}.$ 

## Chorus 3 (A-A-B-A)

A—Saxophones play harmonized version of main theme (4 measures); followed by unmuted trumpet solo (Nance).

A-trumpet solo continues, with sustained chords in saxophones.

 $\label{eq:bases} \textbf{B---}trumpet solo with countermelodies in saxes and trombones; closes with fanfare without rhythm accompaniment; punctuated by cymbal crash.$ 

 $A \hspace{-0.8cm} \hbox{---original theme played by saxophones in new key (E flat); brass interjects, alternating with muted and open notes.$ 

Coda—two repetitions of A (8 bars each), first mezzo piano, then softer, with final closing sax riff.
