Sheng: China Dreams: Prelude

DATE OF WORK: 1995

MEDIUM: Orchestra, with diverse percussion instruments

MOVEMENTS: Prelude

Fanfare

The Stream Flows

The Three Gorges of the Long River

WHAT TO LISTEN FOR: Asian musical lines and textures evoked.

Lyrical pentatonic melodies in woodwinds and strings; transformed

throughout.

Melodies subtly syncopated over barlines.

Brilliant orchestration; instrument families juxtaposed. Brass and harp used percussively; dissonant punctuations. Sliding (glissando) effects in low brass, timpani, strings.

Oboe and English horn, with haunting pentatonic melody with grace notes, accompanied by viola line and plucked low strings:



Melody taken over by clarinets, interrupted by quick flourishes in double reeds and trumpets; punctuated by harp and percussion; very Asian sound:



Melody passed to bass clarinet, closes on held note (fermata).

Pace slackens (meno mosso); new version of melody in violas:



Sharp, percussive notes plucked in violins and harp; crescendos to fortissimo.

Loud motive in French horns interrupts piccolo melody; more animated, then decrescendo:



Quieter section; flute with melody, accompanied by active harp line and trombone playing gliss and os:



Violins have melody; lyrical.

Flute melody accompanied by repeated notes in flute/piccolo.

Rich string section takes over; brass interjection.

 $Texture\ becomes\ more\ polyphonic;\ builds\ to\ climax.$ 

Loud timpani and low brass intrude on melody, *fortissimo*; timpani and trombones with glissandos.

 $Brass\ dominate\ with\ quick\ inverted\ dotted\ idea;\ rising\ then\ falling;\ very\ loud\ climax;\ trombones\ and\ timpani\ sliding\ in\ intervals.$ 

Decrescendo to ppp.

Return to English horn melody, accompanied by high piccolo and pizzicato strings; soft dissonance fades out.
